2022 marked the golden anniversary of Land of Lincoln Legal Aid's establishment. Huzzah! Through the decades, we have grown and innovated in how we work in our community and deliver our services. When we were founded in 1972, we served 13 counties; today we serve 65. We have more than 145 staff members who zealously pursue justice. The hallmark of our 50 years is our consistent work with low-income Illinoisans to achieve justice in civil legal cases where legal assistance can mean the difference between staying housed, or becoming homeless; staying in school, or being expelled; getting a job or remaining unemployed; and being safe or living in fear.

For the past 50 years, as well as the present, the bedrock of our organization has been our staff. Land of Lincoln has been blessed with dedicated, passionate staff whose advocacy and compassion have helped hundreds of thousands of clients. From our Legal Advice and Referral Center staff who helped a woman sue her landlord and obtain a judgment, to litigation before the Illinois Supreme Court in the seminal case, *Glasoe v. Trinkle*, that established that tenants are entitled to rental housing that is fit to live in, we consistently achieve significant results for our clients and our community.

If we reflect on our past, it is amazing we are here today. We've weathered funding cuts, restrictions, and office closures. And yet, we've flourished. We serve clients through five medical-legal partnerships sprinkled through the state. We've worked with courts to establish foreclosure and eviction mediation programs, as well as eviction help desks. Our synergy with domestic violence agencies has created a thriving safety net for domestic violence survivors who need assistance. Our 12 case workers enhance our work, helping our clients find new affordable housing and obtain Medicaid.

Thanks to all of you, Land of Lincoln is still here today providing low-income Illinoisans with legal help when they need it most. We appreciate your pro bono assistance and your promotion of our life-changing legal help. We are deeply grateful for your funding and gifts that ensure our doors are open to those who need the help of an attorney. Here's to 50 more years of serving central and southern Illinois together!

20TH ANNIVERSARY OF MLPSI

The Medical-Legal Partnership of Southern Illinois (MLPSI) is a collaborative partnership between Southern Illinois Healthcare (SIH) and the Southern Regional Office of Land of Lincoln Legal Aid. This partnership was formed in 2002 to provide legal assistance to the low-income patients of SIH and Shawnee Health Service in an effort to improve health-harming legal needs.

MLPSI Success Story

Ms. B was referred by Shawnee Healthcare and is also a patient at SIH Medical Group. Ms. B was the sole caretaker of her grandchild after her own child passed away and the other parent not being a stabilizing force for the child. A Land of Lincoln attorney filed a petition for Ms. B to have custody of her grandchild so that caring for the child would be easier. Ms. B was awarded custody of her grandchild. Ms. B and her grandchild were very happy with this outcome.

Nearly \$9 million in medical and other debt relieved

In addition to providing legal services to low-income Illinoisans, MLPSI staff also regularly provide training to medical staff and other community partners to help recognize when they should be referring their patients/clients to Land of Lincoln to assist with their legal needs.



MLPSI Success Story

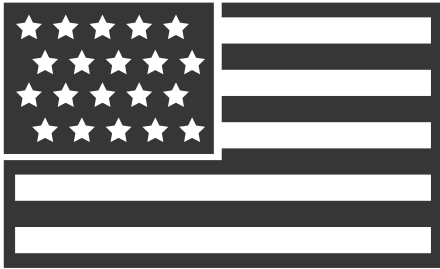
Mr. W was referred to Land of Lincoln by SIH. He had lost his job in March 2020 as a result of a COVID related business closure. Mr. W attempted to work at odd jobs to make ends meet, but eventually applied for unemployment and began receiving benefits. Mr. W was then diagnosed with a serious medical condition and filed an application for Social Security Disability. The IL Dept. of Employment Security then questioned whether Mr. W was "able to work" as required for eligibility of benefits. Mr. W's benefits were stopped and he was charged an overpayment of nearly \$12,000. Land of Lincoln represented Mr. W at the hearing and the Judge found that he was entitled to benefits. The overpayment was eliminated and Mr. W received over \$4,000 in backpay with his weekly benefit reinstated.



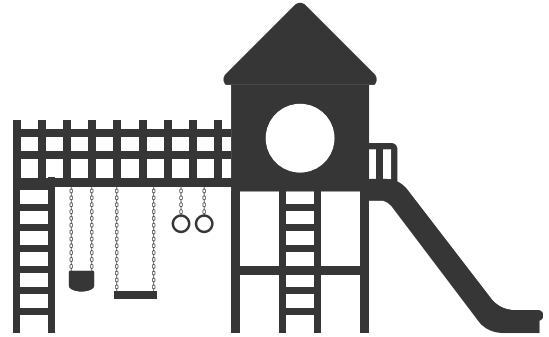

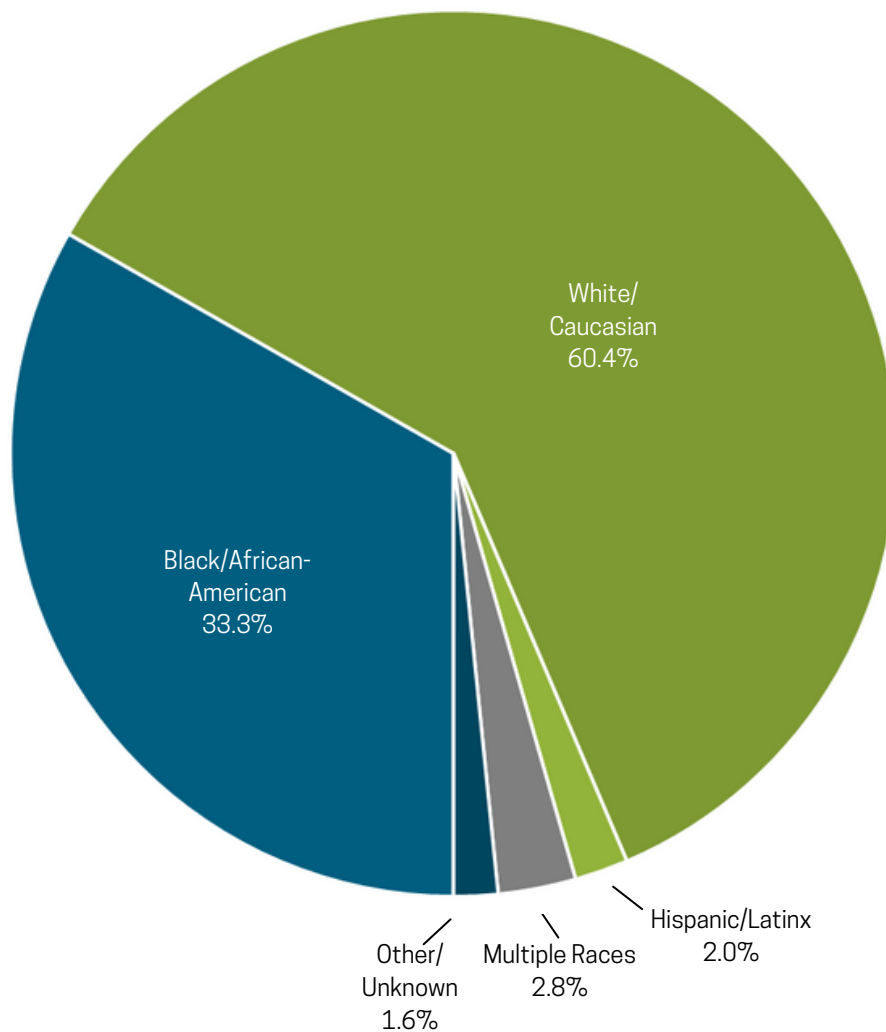

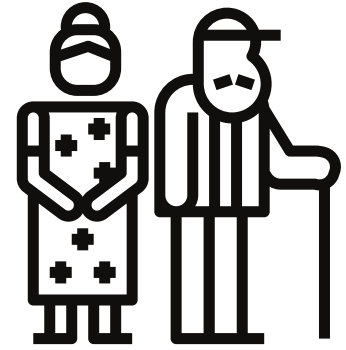

Thanks to the generosity of our supporters, Land of Lincoln was able to help more than 10,800 clients throughout our 65-county service area.

KEEPING SURVIVORS SAFE

Sarah, a 28-year-old woman, requested help in obtaining an order of protection against her ex-boyfriend who was harassing her using social media, threatening to rape and kill her. He had created 17 different online accounts to stalk, harass, and threaten her.

Sarah obtained an emergency order of protection, but needed additional help presenting her case in court, and understanding her rights and safety. She was unable to present her case without help from an attorney. A Land of Lincoln attorney represented Sarah and helped her obtain a two-year order of protection.

While her ex-boyfriend stopped harassing Sarah for a short period of time, he started back up, violating the order of protection. Land of Lincoln assisted Sarah in explaining her rights and connected her with local law enforcement to enforce the Order.





KEEPING VETERANS HOUSED

Pete, a 67-year-old veteran, was referred to Land of Lincoln by the Veterans Administration (VA), because he was at risk of homelessness. Pete had received a notice that he must vacate the apartment he had been renting for the past 5 years due to upcoming construction and repairs on the unit. The landlord had informed all tenants that they must be out by the end of the year and instructed them not to pay rent for the last month.

Pete received a HUD-Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (HUD-VASH) voucher and was current on rent. Due to his medical conditions, he was at high risk for COVID and did not want to be forced into communal or shelter housing.

Ultimately, Pete did not want to move and really wanted to stay in his home. The Land of Lincoln attorney negotiated with the landlord to let Pete stay in the unit during the remodeling. Pete was extremely happy because he loved the location of his home and did not want the burden of moving.



STOPPING UNJUST EVICTIONS

Jarrold, a 36-year-old man with cognitive disabilities and mental illness, came to Land of Lincoln for assistance with requesting a reasonable accommodation in the form of an exception to the policy regarding criminal activity on housing property. Jarrold had been repeatedly taken advantage of by his brother and other unhoused individuals who hung around outside of the housing complex where he lives independently. Jarrold received a termination notice after suspicious activity and police reports were made on his guests.

The main culprit of the problems at Jarrold's residence was his brother. They had lived together while Jarrold was on the waitlist for a subsidized housing unit, but his brother was a bully and hit him with a chair. Thankfully, Jarrold got his own place soon after that incident. Everything was initially fine, but there were several transient people hanging around the complex and they soon preyed on Jarrold. According to Jarrold's aunt who was involved with his care, the housing authority management knew about the individuals hanging around but did nothing to make them leave. Jarrold's brother claimed he was coming around to check in on Jarrold, at first. But the brother was arrested and gave Jarrold's address to the police instead of his own. As a result, Jarrold faced eviction for having an unauthorized occupant of his unit.

A Land of Lincoln attorney met with Jarrold to assess his competency and understand his needs. Jarrold said he wanted to keep his apartment. He did not want people running in and out, but struggled with telling his brother and others "no." He also trusted his aunt and wanted her involved with his case. Jarrold's aunt was very involved and had asked the housing authority to do more about the people hanging around the complex.

Our attorney felt that she could make a case for reasonable accommodation which would allow Jarrold to remain in his home. In the meantime, Jarrold was taking steps to maintain his independence. He had the locks changed at his apartment and began to explore the idea of a work program. He also hired a new home health aide and worked on asserting himself more. To maintain his subsidized housing, Jarrold would need to put his brother on the banned list and learn to tell him no. After some practice, Jarrold became confident in articulating that his brother could not come in his apartment because he was banned.

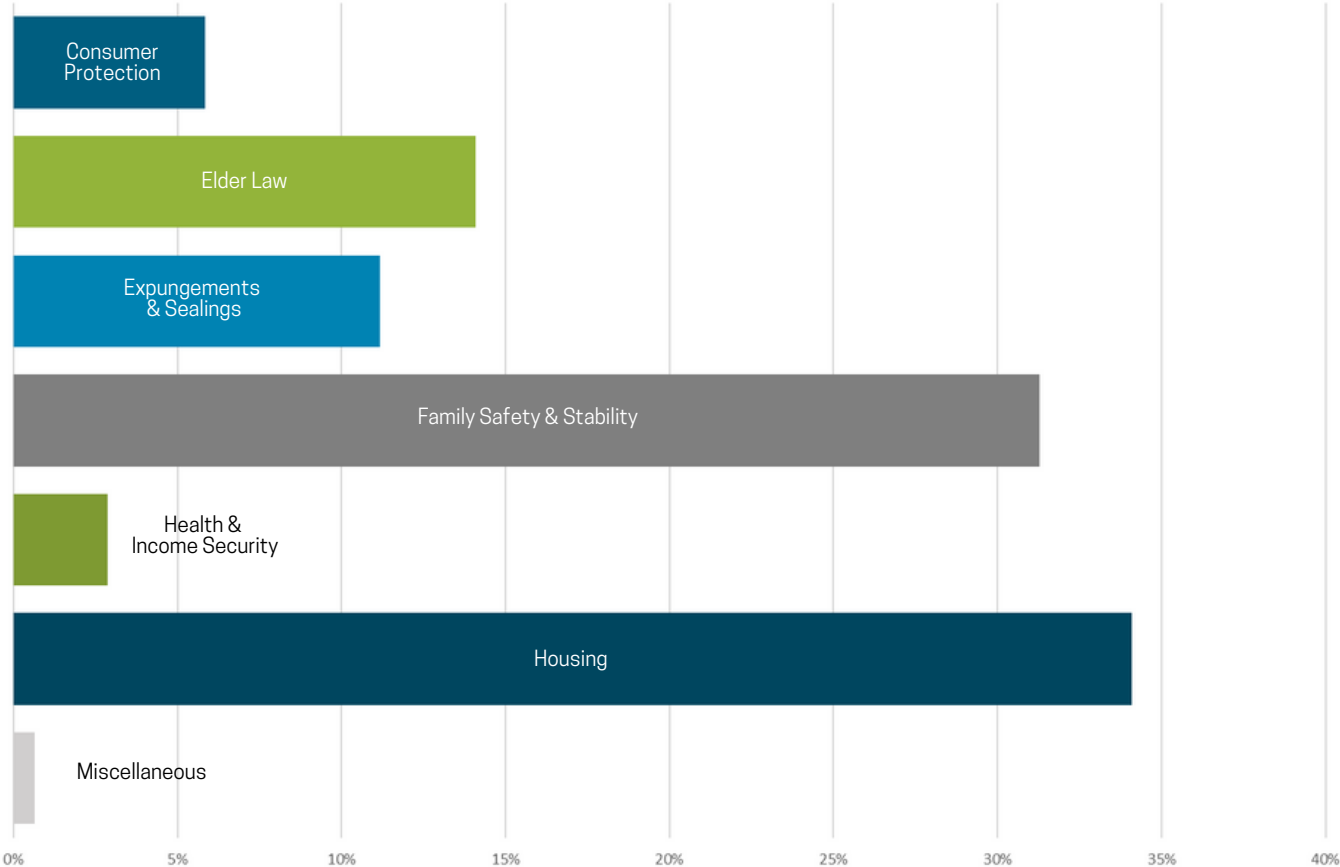
Ultimately, our attorney was successful in getting the eviction case dismissed and sealed. Jarrold was able to remain housed and is on the waiting list for a subsidized unit in a neighboring county, where he can maintain his independence and have more space from his family.

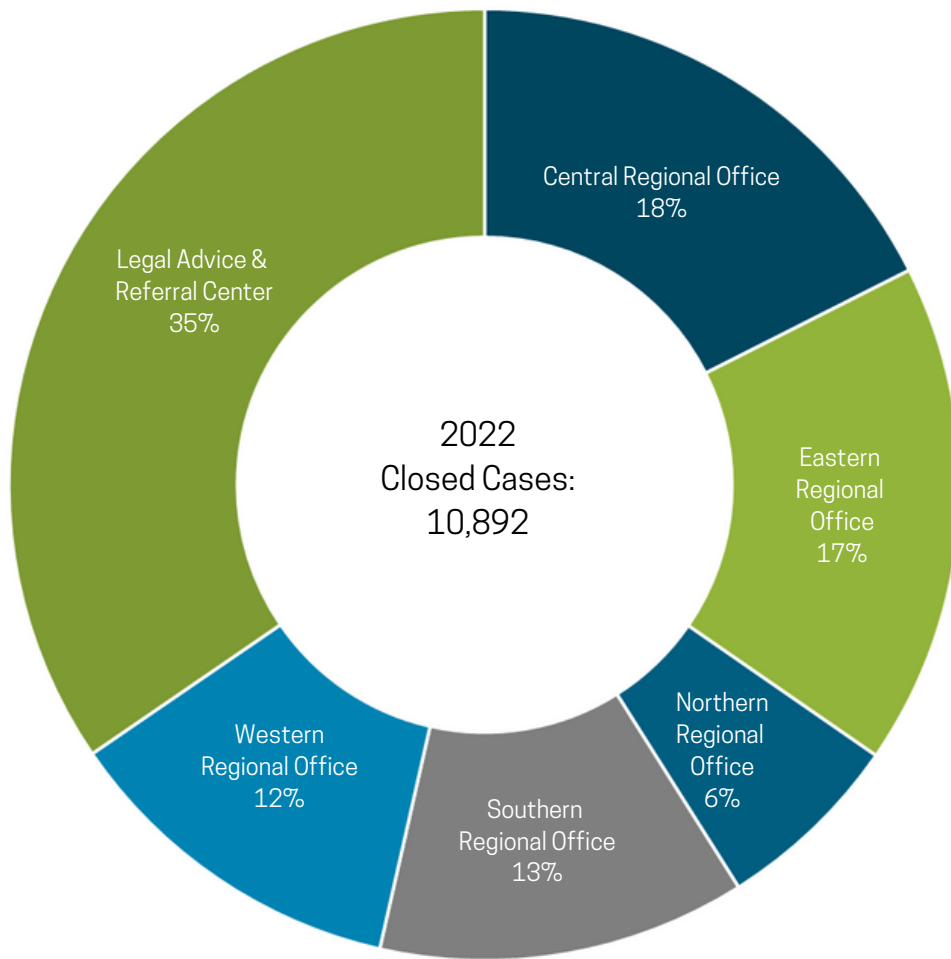


2022 CLOSED CASES

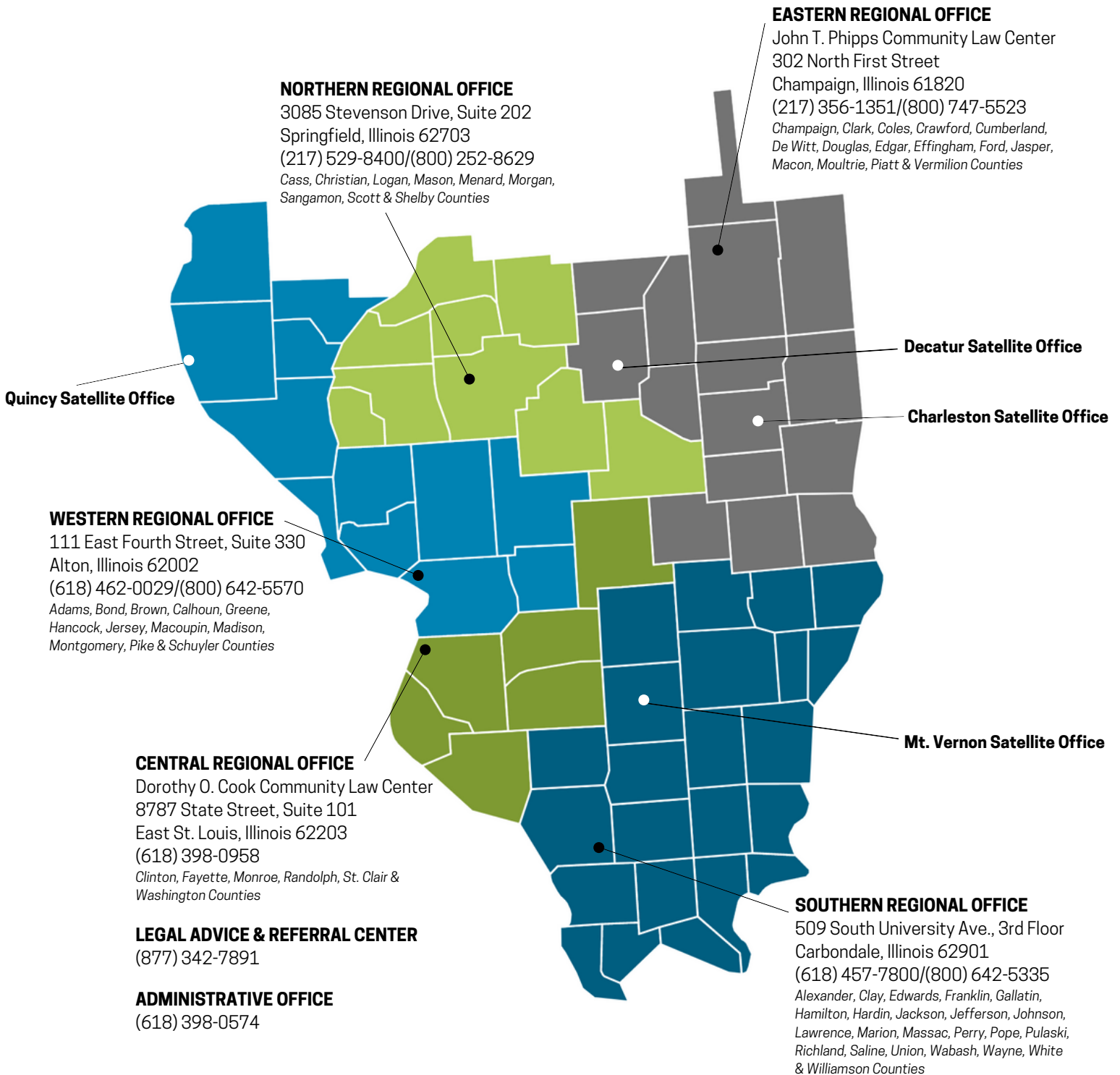

PRO BONO SPOTLIGHT

A Veteran came to Land of Lincoln for help with the expungement and sealing of his criminal records that were preventing him from securing better employment to support himself. Land of Lincoln successfully cleared those criminal records, but he had lost his driving privileges after several DUI convictions. After trying to navigate the reinstatement process on his own, he was denied after an administrative hearing.

Land of Lincoln accepted the veteran into our Pro Bono Program and referred his case to attorney Tom Speedie, who agreed to assist the client pro bono despite a looming deadline. Mr. Speedie sprung into action and secured a win for the client in a new hearing. The client was given a permit that allows him to drive 12 hours a day, 6 days a week for any purpose, and he is "on the road" to getting his license back.

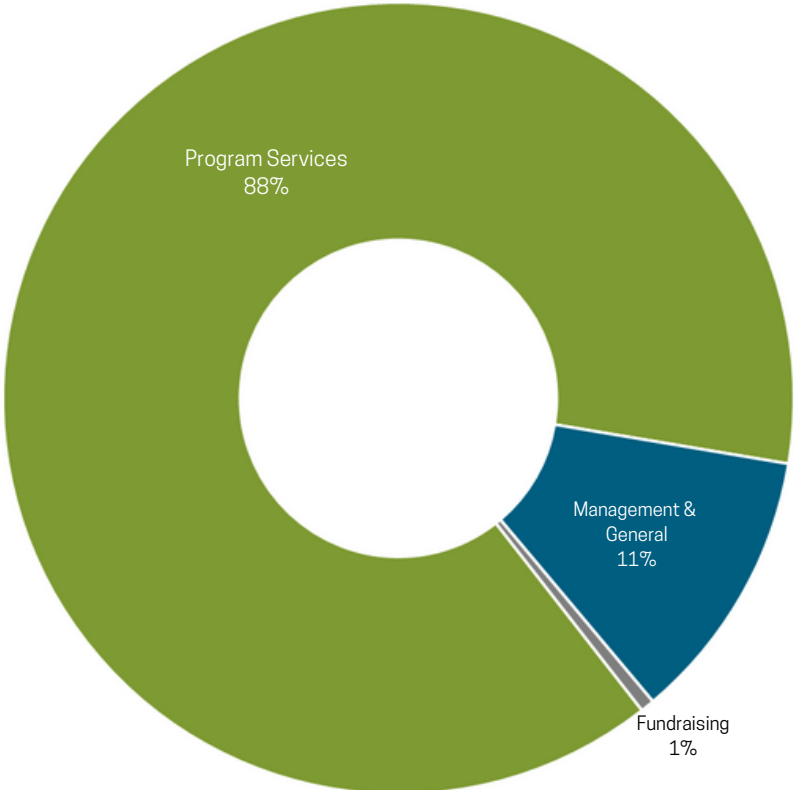
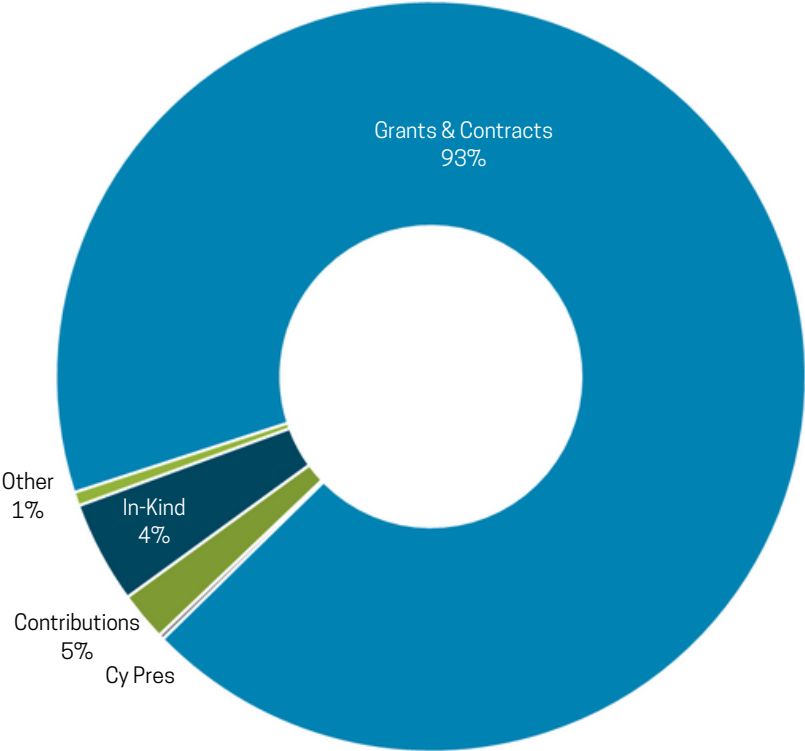
